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

FRED MEYER - NORTHWEST MERCHANT

First and foremost, Fred G. Meyer was a retailer with a great idea: One-Stop Shopping. But he was more than that. He was also a philosopher, semanticist and teacher. The Wall Street Journal once described Meyer as "the last of the great American entrepreneurs." At birth, he was given the name Frederick Grubmeyer and he was born in Brooklyn, New York on February 21, 1886. Fred and his brothers shortened the last name to Meyer and moved west. When he was 22 years old, Fred traveled through the American West before settling in Portland, Oregon in 1908. Drawing on his experience working for his family's grocery business, Mr. Meyer began selling coffee from a horse-drawn cart to workers at farms and lumber camps.


Meyer went in search of new ventures in Alaska but he returned to Oregon where he founded a coffee shop, the Java Coffee Company. The name was later changed to Mission Coffee Company in 1915. In 1922, Meyer opened a grocery store bearing his name in downtown Portland. He expanded this store into the Fred Meyer chain of supermarkets and department stores.

Meyer introduced several innovative retail marketing concepts. His vision was to give customers more reasons to shop in his store than in any other. Before he opened his new store, customers went to separate shops for meat, produce, cheese and other goods. Meyer placed these all under one roof and put an expert in charge of each area. In 1933, he built the Hollywood Fred Meyer, his first full-block megastore, on Northeast Sandy Boulevard at 42nd Avenue in Portland. This building has housed a Rite Aid since Fred Meyer's relocation to Hollywood West, near 28th & Sandy Blvd., in 1988.

Fred Meyer's wife Eva passed away in 1960 and Fred lived to the age of 92, dying September 2, 1978. In 1999, Fred Meyer's 900 stores merged with the Kroger Company, and they continue to operate from headquarters in Portland.
