



Memories of Hood River's Koberg Beach





When they found a basalt cliff and a beautiful white sandy beach in 1860, John and Nancy Stanley decided to homestead what would later become Hood River. They thought this was a perfect location to operate a ferry across the Columbia River to Bingen, Washington.

The ferry was made up of a barge for hauling livestock and wagons that was pushed by a sailboat carrying people. When the wind was with you, the ride only took twenty minutes. Steamboats often stopped at Stanley Rock, which was named after the homesteaders, instead of at Hood River because the channel there was very unpredictable.

John H. Koberg came to Hood River from Schleswig in Holstein, Germany in 1887. He married Emma Lage, the daughter of one of the first families to settle in the Pine Grove area. In 1894, the Kobergs purchased 120 acres of river land from John Stanley. They developed the original pasture lands along the Columbia River and used 20 acres for a truck farm, which is a small farm where fruits and vegetables are grown for selling to the public. Peaches, asparagus, and tomatoes grown by the Kobergs became famous and were in high demand at Portland markets.

The biggest event of the year was the 4th of July celebration. Everyone in the area descended upon Koberg Beach. They started the day with picnics, then danced in the evening. Afterwards, they finished the evening with a fireworks display from a barge offshore.

Many local events were held at Koberg Beach. The Apple Growers Association and other large groups held their annual picnics, along with water carnivals. There were beach games, horseshoes, baseball, watermelon eating contests, and even boxing matches.

Children who lived in the area received free swimming lessons at Koberg Beach. In 1930, the American Red Cross sponsored the first "Learn to Swim" school at Koberg. In 1936, approximately one thousand children attended the program. A bus transported the children from town over Indian Mountain Road to the Beach.

That same year, Hood River's own water park with a long waterslide and three-level diving platform were added. However, it all came to an end. The opening of Bonneville Dam in 1938 took a toll on Koberg's resort.



As the waters of the Columbia River rose, they washed over the wonderful beach, and assaulted the once magnificent pavilion, undermining the lower floors and rendering it a safety hazard. The cottonwoods were submerged in the rising water. In 1951, the federal government purchased the property to build an exit and a rest area to service the new four-lane interstate highway.
